"Testimony of Elder Minos Arthur (M.A.) Smith"

Minos Arthur (M.A.) Smith was my paternal grandfather.

M.A. Smith was born into a wealthy family that owned a sizeable set of oil wells throughout Oklahoma, as well as multiple ranches and banks. Back in these days M.A. Smith's family was well worth multiple millions of dollars. M.A. was raised as a faithful Methodist. As a young man, M.A. met his future wife, Elizabeth (Moore). While preparing for marriage, they both agreed that it was best to be of one faith and agreed to study each other's churches. Elizabeth was a faithful member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (RLDS) and had a gift of faith in the truth of the Restored Gospel. As they studied and prayed together, M.A. fell in love with the Fullness of the Gospel and made intentions to unite with the RLDS.

M.A. went to his father, Jim, to advise him of his intentions to marry Elizabeth and unite with the RLDS. At the time declared by M.A., the nurses on duty noted (2) two men dressed well in clean suits had walked by the nurses station and visited M.A. Note that the only way in or out to his room was to pass by the nurses station, The orderly attending to M.A. noted that M.A. was overjoyed exclaiming "They're coming to get me!" The orderly went to the nurse's station to report the patients unusual remarks, and when the nurse and orderly returned to M.A.'s room, M.A. had passed away, on to his reward, and the (2) men had disappeared! M.A. Smith lived a full life, loved, lived, and breathed the Fullness of the Gospel, and endured to the end through his last breath!
